## Hurricane Katrina/Hurricane Rita Evacuation and Production Shut-in Statistics Report as of Monday November 28, 2005

These evacuations are equivalent to 16.24% of 819 manned platforms and 0.75% of 134 rigs currently operating in the Gulf of Mexico (GOM).

Today's shut-in oil production is 594,421 BOPD. This shut-in oil production is equivalent to 39.63% of the daily oil production in the GOM, which is currently approximately 1.5 million BOPD.

Today's shut-in gas production is 3.060 BCFPD. This shut-in gas production is equivalent to 30.60% of the daily gas production in the GOM, which is currently approximately 10 BCFPD.

The cumulative shut-in oil production for the period 8/26/05-11/28/05 is 94,767,076 bbls, which is equivalent to 13.408% of the cumulative yearly production of oil in the GOM (approximately 547.5 million barrels).

The cumulative shut-in gas production 8/26/05-11/28/05 is 489.376 BCF, which is equivalent to 13.408% of the cumulative gas production in the GOM (approximately 3.65 TCF).

These cumulative numbers reflect updated production numbers from all previous reports. The reports only received by 11:30 a.m. CST. If a company does not report by 11:30 a.m. it is not included in the special information report. The information is included in the cumulative shut-in production. This may result in an apparent increase in the cumulative report.

Shut-ins for oil and gas production are standard procedures conducted by industry for safety reasons. Once inspected and all standard checks have been completed the production for these facilities will be brought back on line.

The MMS will continue to update the shut-in statistics at 1:00 PM CST each day until these statistics are no longer applicable.
