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Basic Concepts: Consultation in Canada

Duty to consult

 Where government has a decision-making role, the obligation on the Crown (government) to consult and determine if Aboriginal rights will be infringed or affected.

Consultation versus Engagement

 Consultation is the legal obligation of government. Engagement is what a project proponent does to build a relationship with an Aboriginal group. Government uses the proponent's engagement record to scope the consultation and an initial degree of accommodation.

Accommodation


• Accommodation is the compensation for infringement of a right. It is determined on a case by case basis. Government relies on proponent mitigation to provide part of the accommodation.

Reconciliation

 The Government of Canada ran a Truth and Reconciliation Commission to address residential school harms. The resulting report led to a national strategy to address the impacts. These actions can be used to design mitigation strategies.

Qikiqtani Inuit Association (QIA)

- 13 communities, 15,000 Inuit
- QIA is normally an organization that is consulted
- QIA does its own engagement with our communities.
- Reflections from both sides of the table.




Understanding Differences

- Each community is very different
 - Learn the expectations of communities and challenges they face
 - Understanding balance of protection of the environment and socio-cultural values with economic opportunities
- Engagement is unique in Nunavut
 - Regulatory system with built in timelines help get consultation right
 - Set timelines viewed as an opportunity to engage not a penalty or delay
- Knowledge based decision making

Trust and Respect

- Connecting
 - Face to face meetings / offices build trust
 - Meetings involving the entire community
 - Provide answers to questions in a language and format that is accessible.
- Real benefits and linked to reconciliation
 - Employment opportunities
 - Training
 - Joint ventures
- If engagement does not result in trust, communities will let regulators know they are displeased



Indigenous Knowledge / Inuit Qaujimajatuganqit


- Inuit Qaujimajatuganqit (IQ) is the cultural cornerstone
 - IQ is to be used in decision-making
 - Oral in nature
 - Equal weight as scientific knowledge

 IQ allows one to understand the cultural values attached to the information

Consultation Case Study Supreme Court of Canada: "Clyde River vs PGS Inc"

- "True reconciliation, is rarely, if ever, achieved in a courtroom"
- The duty to consult falls along a spectrum ranging from limited to deep consultation.
- Supreme Court decision clarified consultation obligations on government:
 - Inuit treaty rights (established right to hunt and harvest marine mammals)
 - Impacts on rights
 - Possible accommodations
 - Response to non-compensable damage



Lessons Learnt "Clyde vs PGS Inc" Going Beyond Consultation

Opportunities for participation and consultation:

- Oral hearings
- Opportunities to make submissions for consideration
- Formal participation in decision making process (IQ map)
- Participant funding, which allows communities/ Inuit to review and submit their own scientific evidence and IQ and the opportunity to test the evidence of the proponent.

Show that you're listening:

- Changes made to the project in light of consultations show that concessions were made and concerns were heard.
- Written reasons show that community/Inuit concerns were considered
- Reveal how the concerns had an impact on decisions.

What could have been done? "Clyde River vs PGS Inc"

- Inuit organizations stated that completing a Strategic EA before authorizing any seismic exploration could have helped fulfil consultation requirements
- Fill gaps in review before a decision is made.
- Provide Community Liaison Officers 's in communities/ offices (employment)
- Design and implement a traditional knowledge study



Meaningful Engagement

- Goal of consultation is to identify, minimize and address adverse impacts where possible.
- Talking together for mutual understanding.
- Written reasons foster reconciliation by showing affected indigenous people that their rights were considered and addressed and promote better decision making.
- Empower Inuit to make decisions using traditional knowledge.
- Take the time to develop a project in a way that can benefit Inuit and communities.
