Executive Summary

This Progress Report is prepared in accordance with Invenergy California Offshore LLC's (Invenergy; Lessee) Commercial Lease OCS-P 0565 (Lease), which requires that Invenergy submit a Progress Report to the Bureau of Ocean Energy Management (BOEM) every six months through the Construction and Operations Plan approval process. This Progress Report covers the reporting period from **June 1, 2025, to November 30, 2025**.

As required by Addendum C, Section 3.1 of the Lease, this Progress Report documents overall project progress and engagement activities undertaken with agencies, Native American Tribes (Tribes), communities, ocean user groups, and the public over the reporting period, as well as plans for continued engagement.

Invenergy maintains an Agency Liaison, Tribal Liaison, and Fisheries Liaison to direct agency, Tribal, fisheries, and other stakeholder engagement. During this reporting period, Invenergy met with Tribes, agencies, and representatives from the fishing industry to provide project updates and engage on the California Coastal Commission's (CCC) Offshore Wind Energy and Fisheries Working Group (Working Group).

Invenergy will remain engaged and available to share information and maintain open lines of communication as part of its commitment to transparent and responsible development.

1 Purpose and Background

1.1 Purpose

This Progress Report is prepared in accordance with Commercial Lease OCS-P 0565, which requires that the lessee submit a Progress Report to the Bureau of Ocean Energy Management (BOEM) every six months through the Construction and Operations Plan approval process. This Progress Report covers the reporting period from **June 1, 2025, to November 30, 2025**. As required by Addendum C, Section 3.1 of the Lease, this Progress Report documents overall project progress and engagement activities undertaken with agencies, Native American Tribes (Tribes), communities, ocean user groups, and the public over the reporting period, as well as plans for continued engagement.

1.2 Lessee Information


The Even Keel Wind project is being developed on Lease OCS-P 0565 by Invenery California Offshore LLC (Invenery; Lessee). Invenery and its affiliates have successfully developed over 220 projects, comprising over 34 gigawatts of energy generation capacity. In addition to the EKW project, Invenery is the lead developer of Leases OCS-A 0562 and OCS-A 0567 in the Gulf of Maine and Lease OCS-A 0542 in the New York Bight.

In early 2025, federal actions created challenges with respect to regulatory and policy certainty for offshore wind. Given these challenges, Invenery has limited its development activities for Lease OCS-P-0565 in the near-term, which includes external engagement. This Progress Report describes engagement with Tribes, fishing communities, agencies, and communities that has occurred over the reporting period. Invenery will remain engaged and available to share information and maintain open lines of communication as part of its commitment to transparent and responsible development.

1.3 Lease Description

Lease OCS-P 0565 was executed on June 1, 2023. The Lease is located more than 20 miles from the closest location onshore and encompasses approximately 80,000 acres of the Outer Continental Shelf (OCS). See Figure 1. Invenery intends to build wind turbine generators and offshore substation(s) on Lease OCS-P 0565, which will connect to California's onshore electrical grid through export cables.

2 Tribal Engagement

This section provides a summary of Invenery's engagement activities with Tribes over the reporting period. Invenery continues engagement with Tribes in accordance with the Central Coast Lessees' Joint Native American Tribes Communications Plan. Invenery works collaboratively with the other two Central Coast Lessees (Golden State Wind and Atlas Wind) to reduce the overall communication burden on Tribes. Invenery has a designated Tribal Liaison (Appendix B) who serves as the primary point of contact responsible for communicating project information to the Tribes. The Tribal Liaison will also collect input from the Tribes to inform project decision making.

2.1 Overall Tribal Engagement Progress with Tribes

During the reporting period, Invenery’s direct communication with Tribes was focused on providing project updates and engaging in the California Coastal Commission (CCC) Offshore Wind Energy and Fisheries Working Group (Working Group), which Invenery and Tribes are members. Table 1 includes a summary of engagement activities Invenery conducted with Tribes during the reporting period, with the exception of engagement with the CCC Working Group, which is included in Table 5.

3.2 Summary of State Agency Engagement Activities

Engagement with state agencies over the reporting period focused on the CCC Working Group. The CCC Working Group is tasked with creating a strategy to ensure that offshore wind projects avoid and minimize impacts on fisheries. This strategy includes best management practices to reduce impacts on fishing activities to support the long-term resilience of fisheries and fishing communities. The CCC Working Group also aims to provide fair compensation to affected commercial and recreational fishing interests, as well as Tribal fisheries, for economic impacts from offshore wind development. The CCC Working Group is comprised of members from commercial and recreational fishing industries, Tribal fisheries, California offshore wind Lessees, state agencies, and federal agencies.

Invenery does not anticipate conducting any surveys during the next reporting period (December 01, 2025 to May 31, 2026). Invenery has an agreement with TGS to purchase data from its wind and metocean measurement campaign. The TGS campaign consists of a three-year deployment of a buoy that will study meteorological and oceanographic conditions in the vicinity of the Morro Bay Wind Energy Areas. Invenery determined that the information to be collected by TGS will be valuable to the Even Keel Wind project’s broader data collection efforts.

6 Coordinated Engagement

Throughout the reporting period, the Central Coast Lessees, Invenery, Golden State Wind (OCS-P 0564), and Equinor (OCS-P 0563), have coordinated efforts on Tribal engagement, as detailed above. The Central Coast Lessees have also coordinated with RWE Offshore Wind (OCS-P 0561) and Vineyard Wind (OCS-P 0562) through the CCC Working Group.

Invenery also continues to work with the wider offshore wind industry through trade associations, including American Clean Power, to assess relevant emerging policy and directives and coordinate on appropriate response strategies.
