California Intergovernmental Renewable Energy Task Force Meeting

Tuesday, July 13, 2021 9:00 a.m. – 5:00 p.m. PT

I. Introduction

The Bureau of Ocean Energy Management (BOEM) convened a State of California Intergovernmental Renewable Energy Task Force Meeting on July 13, 2021. The meeting was held remotely via webinar using the Zoom platform. Task Force member Participants included representatives from federal and state agencies, tribal nations, and local government. Participating members of the public included representatives from industry, academic and research institutions, and non-governmental organizations (NGOs). Approximately 400 participants attended the meeting.

The meeting's objectives were to:

- Update Task Force members on progress since the March 2020 Task Force meeting.
- Discuss next steps for offshore wind off California's Central and North Coasts.
- Outline next steps to provide input into the process.
- Receive public input on Task Force items.

II. Discussion Highlights

A. Welcome and Opening Remarks

1. Amanda Lefton, Director, BOEM.

Director Amanda Lefton welcomed participants to the BOEM California Intergovernmental Renewable Energy Task Force Meeting and reiterated Governor Newsom's sustainable energy goals and BOEM's goals for advancing opportunities for renewable energy within the State of California. Director Lefton announced that BOEM will publish a <u>Call for Information and Nominations (Call)</u> in the Federal Register on July 29, 2021, requesting information from the public and industry interest in commercial offshore wind energy development for two new areas within a 399-square-mile area located off central California, identified as the <u>Morro Bay Call Area East and West Extensions</u>. She encouraged participants to think innovatively when submitting comments. Director Lefton concluded her remarks by reiterating the importance of regional collaboration between agencies and stakeholders for responsibly advancing renewable energy initiatives within the state of California.

2. Wade Crowfoot, Secretary, CNRA. California Natural Resources Agency (CNRA)

Secretary Crowfoot highlighted the extreme weather events that have impacted California over the last year and emphasized his commitment to addressing climate change through innovative renewable energy policies. He underscored the crucial role that offshore energy production currently plays in reaching the State's climate and sustainability goals and funding related to coastal restoration efforts. He noted the many activities already occurring off California's coast relating to oil and gas, commercial fishing, mineral activities, and sediment management, and he reflected that this Task Force will be charged with navigating these existing conflicts with the addition of offshore wind, while supporting the remarkable biodiversity, beauty, and all of those who benefit from the coast's commercial use.

3. Karen Douglas, California Energy Commission (CEC)

Commissioner Douglas shared that California is well positioned to deploy offshore wind technology in the North and Central Coasts and to help meet supply chain, fabrication, and design needs. She reiterated the significance of offshore wind to California's renewable energy goals and highlighted that the next major opportunities lie 20 to 30 miles offshore where there is the most potential for renewable wind energy.

4. Ron Tickle, Deputy Assistant Secretary of Defense, Department of Defense (DOD)

Deputy Assistant Secretary of Defense Ron Tickle shared that the creation of this Task Force to explore renewable energy within California aligns with the Biden-Harris Administration's goal of pursuing renewable energy. He relayed that tackling the climate crisis is a national security imperative, and that

the DOD is committed to working across the U.S. Government to find solutions to support renewable energy in a manner that is compatible with essential military operations. He noted that the DOD supports advancement of the Northern California Humboldt Call Area, and that the DOD worked closely with the White House, the Department of the Interior, and the state of California to identify the 399 square-mile area off the California Central coast, which could support approximately three gigawatts of clean energy.

B. Task Force Member Introductions & Agenda Review

Mr. Poncelet, facilitator with Kearns & West, introduced the Task Force members, which included representatives from BOEM, elected officials, tribal nations, state and federal agencies, and local officials. Mr. Poncelet also reviewed the meeting agenda, objectives, and process guidelines.

C. Outer Continental Shelf (OCS) Wind Energy Leasing in California

The purpose of this agenda item was to communicate BOEM's role in future renewable activities within the State of California, particularly related to BOEM's Offshore Renewable Energy Program (OREP) and leasing process. This session also reviewed the Task Force Charter to establish a common understanding of the role and future activities of the State of California Intergovernmental Renewable Energy Task Force.

1. BOEM Outer Continental Shelf (OCS) Wind Energy Leasing in California – Jean Thurston-Keller, BOEM

Jean Thurston-Keller, BOEM Intergovernmental Renewable Energy Task Force Coordination and Project Lead BOEM's Pacific regional office, provided an overview of BOEM's responsibilities for offshore energy in federal waters, a brief background of the work completed so far, BOEM's joint approach with the state of California for offshore wind energy planning, next steps in the environmental review process for both the North and Central Coasts, and leasing timelines.

Ms. Thurston-Keller described the Humboldt Call Area on the North Coast. This call area was originally published in the Call for Information and Nominations in 2018. The next step in BOEM's process will be to identify a Humboldt Wind Energy Area (WEA), which will be the focus of an Environmental Assessment. Following the Environmental Assessment, next steps will include publishing a Proposed Sale Notice, publishing a Final Sales Notice, and then conducting a Lease Sale in 2022. Ms. Thurston-Keller noted that the Humboldt and Morro Bay areas will be combined into one Proposed Sale Notice for a single California lease sale that will include both North and Central Coast areas. The public comment period for this notice will 60-days, and this will be the last opportunity for developers to demonstrate interest. Ms. Thurston-Keller also reviewed all of the points throughout the leasing process where Task Force member and stakeholder input will be requested. Ms. Thurston-Keller invited further questions on the BOEM California Outer Continental Shelf Leasing Process to be directed to herself at jean.thurston-keller@boem.gov.

2. Task Force Clarifying Questions

Task Force members posed clarifying questions on such topics as: why BOEM is proposing to combine the Humboldt and Morro Bay call areas in the Proposed Sale Notice, how BOEM will address fishing community concerns, how bidders will again be vetted for the expanded areas around the original Morro Bay Call Area, the timing of the anticipated Proposed Sale Notice, how transmission will take place on land, environmental impacts (including visual impacts and impacts on local communities), and job opportunities.

3. Public Clarifying Questions

Participating members of the public had the opportunity to ask clarifying questions regarding the topics being addressed by the Task Force. Responses were provided in writing throughout the meeting and orally during a designed Public Clarifying Questions session. Public clarifying questions covered such topics as:

- The role and membership of the Task Force.
- The current call areas, BOEM's leasing process, and anticipated timing.
- Impacts of DOD operational areas.
- Lessons learned from offshore energy development on the East Coast.
- Environmental impacts.
- Upcoming opportunities for environmental review and public input.
- Impacts on the fishing industry.
- Jurisdiction for transmission and undersea cables.
- The multi-factor bidding auction process.
- Data being used to inform decision making processes.

D. Task Force Member Updates

The purpose of this session was to acknowledge and share updates on states' renewable energy goals and any recent or upcoming renewable energy activities involving the State of California. 1. Santa Ynez Band of Chumash Indians – Nakia Zavalla

Nakia Zavalla, Cultural Director for the Santa Ynez Band of Chumash Indians, provided an overview of ongoing efforts within the tribe to promote wind energy development in the Central Valley, spanning Chumash aboriginal territory from Paso Robles to Malibu, and out to the Channel Islands. She recognized that BOEM is currently looking at leasing sites offshore of Morro Bay and Diablo Canyon, and that these are ancestral lands of cultural, ceremonial, and spiritual importance to the tribe. She expressed the hope that BOEM will be diligent in recognizing the spiritual importance of Morro Rock and its potential as a sacred site and Traditional Cultural Property.

2. Blue Lake Rancheria Tribe – Jana Ganion

Jana Ganion, Sustainability and Government Affairs Director for the Blue Lake Rancheria Tribal Nation and Co-Chair of the Department of Energy's Indian Country Energy and Infrastructure Working Group, provided an update on Blue Lake Rancheria's renewable energy goals and activities. Ms. Ganion relayed that one of the important themes of energy development for tribal nations is pollution reduction paired with improved reliability and resilience. She noted deficiencies in the North Coast electrical grid and that many North Coast tribal nations still lack connections to the grid. She spoke of the important opportunity provided by clean energy to address these challenges. Ms. Ganion concluded her remarks by updating the Task Force on current initiatives by tribes and others to investigate the components of the benefit stack of offshore wind—including, but not limited to, jobs, new businesses, and businesses ancillary to offshore wind.

3. Cher-Ae Indian Community of the Trinidad Rancheria – Shirley Laos

Shirley Laos, Tribal Member and Government Affairs Coordinator of the Cher-Ae Indian Community of the Trinidad Rancheria, gave an update of ongoing efforts within the tribe to promote offshore wind development and solar energy within the Rancheria. She described her tribe's continued interest to participate in ongoing tribal outreach and engagement efforts related to offshore wind energy.

4. Tribal Engagement Activities - Sara Guiltinan, Thomas Gates

Sara Guiltinan, Leasing Specialist/Regional Tribal Liaison for BOEM Pacific Regional office, opened her remarks thanking the Tribal governments for sharing their inputs in this forum. Thomas Gates, Tribal Liaison for the California Energy Commission, opened his presentation by affirming Ms. Guiltinan's remarks and the partnership between BOEM and the California Energy Commission tribal programs. He emphasized that unlike the federal agency, the state has an obligation to consult with all California Native American Tribes, both federally recognized and non-federally recognized. 5. California Coastal Commission – Kate Huckelbridge

Kate Huckelbridge, Deputy Director for the California Coastal Commission, reviewed the roles and authority of the State of California to review offshore wind development in federal waters under Coastal Zone Management Act and Federal Consistency.

6. Ocean Protection Council – Justine Kimball

Justine Kimball, Senior Scientist with the Ocean Protection Council (OPC), offered an overview of previously funded key environmental studies and how this work will support the process and needs for additional studies and investments going forward to support offshore wind.

8. California Energy Commission – Eli Harland

Eli Harland, Advisor to Commissioner Douglas, California Energy Commission gave an update on public outreach and fishing industry engagement with a focus on recent activities from the state budget and how the budget supports expanded outreach and engagement.

9. California Department of Fish and Wildlife – Chris Potter

Chris Potter, Senior Environmental Scientist Specialist, California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW) gave an overview of fisheries data and environmental review.

10. Task Force Clarifying Questions.

Task Force members commented on and posed clarifying questions on the above presentations. Their comments and questions focused on such topics as: the importance of the West Coast Ocean Alliance Tribal Caucuses document, relevant Cal Poly studies, potential funding for energy storage, the Comprehensive Mitigation Strategy for Fisherman and how to access this, clarifying local authority versus authority of the California Coastal Commission, consideration of climate policy in the federal consistency review process, and funding opportunities.

E. Panel – Federal / State Studies & Other Updates

The purpose of this panel session was to provide updates regarding federal and state studies pertaining to offshore wind energy planning, siting, and development. 1. Bureau of Ocean Energy Management – Rick Yarde

Rick Yarde, Office of Environment Leader in the Pacific Region of BOEM, reviewed current BOEM environmental studies and gave an analysis update. The studies include the Seabird and Marine Mammal Surveys, Near Potential Renewable Energy Sites Offshore Central and Southern California, Development of Computer Simulation to Assess Entanglement Risk to Whales and Leatherback Sea Turtles in Offshore Floating Wind Turbine Moorings, Cables, and Associated Derelict Fishing Gear Offshore California, Offshore Acoustic Bat Study along the California Coastline, and Over Water Migration Movements of Black Brant. Mr. Yarde then went into depth covering three recently completed BOEM studies, the California Current Ecosystem Survey (CCES) 2018: a PacMAPPS study, the Marine Bird Data Synthesis and Predictive Modeling study, and the Benthic Habitats and Geohazards on the West Coast. 2. Bureau of Ocean Energy Management – Frank Pendleton

Frank Pendleton, GIS Analyst, BOEM Pacific Region, offered an overview on Vessel Monitoring System (VMS) Data and a Lidar Buoy update. Mr. Pendleton relayed that BOEM has been coordinating with researchers at a variety of academic institutions and state and federal agencies and commissions regarding fisheries datasets. He also described how BOEM is using lidar buoy data to evaluate wind profiles, validate datasets, and test other devices. 3. United States Coast Guard – Tyrone Conner

Tyrone Conner, Deputy Chief of Waterways and Development for the U.S. Coast Guard's (USCG's) District 11 Office, reviewed the USCG's process for a Pacific Coast Port Access Route Study (PARS) planned to begin this year. The USCG is responsible for protecting all mariners, property, and the environment by promoting safe navigation and access routes. As part of the Port Access Route Study (PARS) under the Ports and Waterways Safety Act, the USCG has authority and responsibility to evaluate, study, and review all navigation when it deals with any major changes on the waterway. Mr. Conner then gave a timeline of the proposed PARS products, with recommendations expected to be announced in October to March of 2027.

4. Department of Defense – Steve Chung

Steve Chung, President Director for the Navy Region Southwest, offered a brief overview of Department of Defense (DOD) Studies. He opened his remarks by restating the DOD's commitment and collaboration on many initiatives to support states renewable energy goals and transition to a cleaner lower carbon future. Mr. Chung explained that the DOD is currently working to fund a study through their Office of Local Defense Community Cooperation to examine transmission infrastructure potential in Northern California and Southern Oregon. He concluded by reiterating that the DOD is open to exploring opportunities for offshore energy proposals that are compatible with DOD operations.

5. California Public Utilities Commission & California Independent System Operator – David Withrow & Jeffery Billinton

David Withrow, staff at the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC), provided an overview of the Integrated Resource Planning (IRP) process. Mr. Withrow explained that IRP modeling is based upon a greenhouse gas target, identified in consultation with the California Air Resources Board (CARB) and adopted by CPUC Commission order.

Jefferey Billinton, Director of Transmission Infrastructure planning at the California Independent System Operator (ISO), provided an update on the Transmission Planning Process Offshore Wind Study. Mr. Billinton explained that approval of transmission projects is based three overall factors: reliability driven need, policy driven need, and economic driven need. As part of this process additional studies are conducted within each planning cycle. Mr. Billinton described the 2021-2022 planning cycle and also provided an overview of the newly introduced ISO, 20-year Transmission Outlook Initiative.

6. California Energy Commission – Rizaldo Aldas

Rizaldo Aldas, Program Manager for the Renewable Energy and Advanced Generation Research and Development, Energy Research and Development Division, California Energy Commission, provided an overview of wind energy-focused research and development projects taking place at the Energy Commission. One set of projects is currently focused on technology development with environmental considerations. A second set of projects is focused on environmental research and potential impacts of offshore wind farms on ecosystems along the California coast.

F. Process Next Steps

Jean Thurston-Keller reviewed key next steps in BOEM's overall leasing process. Ms. Thurston-Keller reminded Task Force members that BOEM published a Call for Information and Nominations (Call) on October 19, 2018, and BOEM continues to seek public input on the potential for wind energy development in the Call Areas. This includes input on site conditions, resources, and multiple uses in close proximity to or within the Call Areas that would be relevant to BOEM's subsequent decision whether to offer all or part of the Call Areas for commercial wind leasing. Ms. Thurston-Keller encouraged industry participants and members of the public to provide comments and information to BOEM.

G. Task Force Discussion and Clarifying Questions

Eric Poncelet invited Task Force members to share reflections or ask clarifying questions regarding the presentations on federal/state studies and other updates, and the recently presented overview of process next steps.

Task Force member comments and questions fell into the following categories.

- <u>Engagement with stakeholders and local communities</u>. Task Force members requested that BOEM and the State take steps to engage effectively with constituencies likely to be impacted by offshore wind development, including the fishing industry and local communities.
- <u>Climate change</u>. Task Force members highlighted the important role begin played by climate change in the offshore wind development process.

- <u>Anticipated leasing process, environmental review, and opportunities for public input</u>. Task Force members asked about the timeline for leasing and environmental review, for both the north and central coast areas.
- <u>Coordination with federal agencies</u>. Task Force members asked about how BOEM would be coordinating with the U.S. Coast Guard about security and safety zones and with NOAA about consultations under the Endangered Species Act, Marine Mammal Protection Act, the Magnusson-Stevens Act, and the National Environmental Policy Act.
- <u>Tribal engagement</u>. Task Force members encouraged BOEM to continue its engagement with Tribal Nations and reminded BOEM that many tribes, especially smaller ones, have limited capacities to engage. These Task Force members suggested that BOEM make funding available to support ongoing participation by tribal members. Another Task Force member suggested that funding be made available to support the engagement of other constituencies of limited means, including local fishing communities.
- <u>Jurisdiction over transmission</u>. Task Force members requested clarification regarding offshore cables and where the producer's project ends and the utility's responsibility to transmit the energy to users begins.

H. Overview of Action Items, Closing Remarks

Eric Poncelet shared that the presentations and meeting recordings will be made available following the Task Force Meeting. He noted that Kearns & West will also develop a meeting summary, which will be posted to the California Task Force webpage

BOEM Regional Director Amanda Lefton, Regional Supervisor Doug Boren, and CEC Commissioner Karen Douglas offered closing remarks to formally close the Task Force Meeting. Each thanked Task Force Members, the presenters, and members of the public for their participation throughout the meeting. They emphasized the role that renewable energy can play to support addressing the climate crisis in the U.S. and the robust collaboration that must occur between stakeholders to meet the Biden Administration's goal of 30 gigawatts of offshore wind by 2030. They encouraged meeting participants to provide comments, questions, or participate in future engagement activities.

I. Public Input Opportunity and Discussion

Following the official adjournment of the Task Force meeting, Mr. Poncelet invited members of the public to share comments or questions on topics covered during the Task Force meeting. A summary of this discussion organized by key themes is provided below.

- <u>Addressing potential conflicts with fisheries</u>. Many attendees voiced concern about potential impacts on fisheries and were worried that BOEM was not adequately engaging with the fishing industry and fishing communities. Offshore wind development needs to be done in a transparent way with meaningful input from these constituencies. Data on potential fisheries impacts needs to be brought in at the beginning of the process. BOEM should also consider providing funding to support participation of local fishing representatives in this process.
- <u>General support for offshore wind energy development in California</u>. Many attendees expressed support for the development of offshore wind energy off the north and central coasts. They recommended building effectively off of the preparatory work that has already been conducted with local stakeholders.
- <u>Job opportunities</u>. Many attendees noted the important opportunity for new job creation coming from offshore wind development in California.

- <u>Multifactor bidding</u>. Several attendees highlighted the supported incorporation of a multifactor bidding process and promoted the development of community benefits agreements (in advance of the lease sales).
- <u>Grid reliability</u>. Several attendees spoke to the importance of grid and electrical system reliability (both onshore and offshore) and asked that transmission capacity needs be addressed.
- <u>Research and Impact Analysis</u>. Several attendees spoke to the importance of making sure that meaningful studies are conducted early enough to inform the decision-making process. It is important to take a holistic look at potential impacts on ecosystems and species, both on land and in the ocean. This information needs to be made available to the public.
- <u>Addressing the climate crisis</u>. Several attendees expressed the view that taking advantage of offshore wind resources in the north and central coasts will be an important step in combatting the climate crisis and achieving California's decarbonization goals.
- <u>Tribal engagement</u>. Several attendees encouraged BOEM and the State to engage proactively and effectively with Native American Tribes in California, both federally and non-federally recognized, to address their interests in marine cultural resources. Some requested that funding be made available to support tribal engagement.
- <u>Appreciation</u>. Attendees thanked BOEM for convening the Task Force meeting, sharing information, and involving the public. They also thanked BOEM for scheduling around other important meetings (e.g., Pacific Fishery Management Council). Early notification of Task Force meetings is important.
