P-R-O-C-E-E-D-I-N-G-S

MR. MICHAEL HALLER: Well, ladies and gentlemen, welcome tonight to our second Barrow session.

And this is scheduled to run from now until 7:30, if need be, and perhaps longer if we need to stick around, depending on what you have to contribute. My name is Michael Haller. I am the tribal liaison for the Bureau of Ocean Energy Management. And, you know, I just remembered a moment ago that we had an invocation earlier for the earlier session. I'm wondering -- I'm looking at you, Willard. Would you mind offering an invocation for us tonight to bless our meeting?

MR. WILLARD NEAKOK: Sure.

(Invocation offered by Willard Neakok.)

MR. MICHAEL HALLER: Thank you very much. I'm going to make a few introductions because some of you were not here earlier today. And I'll just start, first of all, with our Assistant Secretary of the Interior Tommy Beaudreau, and then over to his left is Mark Fesmire, the Regional Director for the Alaska Region of the Bureau of Safety and Environmental Enforcement. And to his left is Dave Johnston, one of our BOEM officers in the Alaska Region. And coming around the corner over there, the lady who wants you to speak very clearly and may ask you to spell it is Mary Vavrik, our court reporter. And to her

left is Mike Routhier, one of our BOEM officers in the Anchorage office in the Alaska Region. And to his left is Lakeisha Harrison. And Lakeisha is a BSEE officer from the Washington, D.C. area.

And then I come back around here, and next to the Secretary to his right is Pat Pourchot, our senior federal Department of the Interior officer for Alaska, and then my boss to my left is Dr. James Kendall, the Director for Alaska Region BOEM. Thanks.

Mr. Secretary.

MR. TOMMY BEAUDREAU: Good evening,
everyone. Thank you very much for spending some time with
us this evening on a Friday night. That is a sacrifice,
and I appreciate you spending some time with us.

Let me describe briefly what the purpose of our outreach and our listening session is, and then I'd like to turn it over to each of you to provide us with your thoughts, your comments, which is really the most important part. This is the reason why we have Mary taking down the information and the thoughts that we receive because the way we want to use this information is to take it back and reference it. So we want to have a good record of our conversation this evening. You will see, you know, each of us will be taking notes, as well. I've already got half a note pad filled from our earlier

session this afternoon.

So again, thank you for coming. Let me tell you a little bit about what we are doing and give you basically an update on where things stand with offshore oil and gas in the Beaufort and the Chukchi Sea. everyone here knows, Shell last year embarked on drilling programs in both the Beaufort and the Chukchi Sea. Their Burger prospect in the Chukchi and their Sivulliq prospect in Camden Bay in the Beaufort. Shell, as you may know, was not able to deploy its subsea containment system as they committed to do and as we required them to do because we felt it would be extremely important for any oil drilling exploration operation in the Arctic to have on site the ability to cap and contain a well in the event the company lost control of that well. And so it was a critical -- in our minds, a critical emergency response system and equipment. And because Shell was unable to deploy that equipment, it failed its deployment test. Mark Fesmire was there to witness it, witness that failure.

We did not allow Shell to drill in the hydrocarbon. We did not allow them to drill through the rock to where the oil may be because they weren't prepared to deal with the contingency associated with that activity.

And so we did allow them to start a well, one well each in the Beaufort and the Chukchi, but only to drill into rock and essentially start a well with the idea that perhaps in the future they may come back and try to complete those wells.

Then, as you know, they had a series of mishaps. There were problems with the Noble Discoverer drill rig which they used in the Chukchi Sea based on inspection by the Coast Guard in Seward. And as everyone knows, they lost their tow on the Kulluk moving from Dutch Harbor, and the Kulluk grounded near Kodiak. And that's part of an ongoing Coast Guard investigation, the reasons why that happened.

But all of those incidents and shortcomings led my boss at the time, Interior Secretary Salazar, to ask me to go back, take -- review Shell's program and develop a set of lessons learned coming out of the 2012 experience. And we did that, and we put it in a report that I delivered to the Secretary on March 8th. Included within the report are a number of principles and findings, some of which were recommendations to the Secretary vis-a-vis industry. Others were actually us looking inward on what we should do better as government regulators.

And one of the recommendations that we basically had for ourselves was the need to develop standards and

regulations and put them in rules that are specific for working in the Alaskan offshore environment. We had a number of Arctic-specific standards that we imposed on Shell, including the containment system, but we did that through conditions on their exploration plans. And then from a regulatory perspective, I think, was satisfactory with respect to Shell's program last year, but what we said and what we committed to with the Secretary is we need to take those rules, look at them, improve on them where necessary, to capture other issues as well, and put them in regulations so that they apply not only to Shell, but to any operator who would seek to do activity offshore Alaska.

We know Shell may repropose activity. I think it's likely that they will repropose activity to complete those wells that they started, as well as potentially to drill new ones. We know ConocoPhillips is out there, as well, although they recently said they would not go forward any sooner than 2015. And then there is other leaseholders such as Statoil that have leases in the Chukchi and may wish to propose activity in the future.

And so what we are doing right now is working to codify the standards that we imposed on Shell, evaluate additional measures that we would put in the regulations. We want to do this by the end of the year because we want

to have at least proposed rules for everyone to look at and comment on by the end of the year so that we are putting those operators on notice of what our expectations are. We think we have been actually quite clear with them what our expectations are, but we will go ahead and put them into a regulation, as well.

The reason we are meeting is there will be that formal rule-making process where we propose a draft rule, we put it out to the public for comment. The public provides us comment, we consider it, we work to finalize the rule. That's the normal rule-making process, and we will do that. But we all, everybody here, felt it was extremely important to talk to stakeholders and in particular North Slope communities early on at the outset of this process and get input on what we should be thinking about as we are actually drafting the proposed rules and take that into the process and let that help guide us early on.

And so that is actually -- as far as, you know, federal government rule making goes, that's actually an unusual step to be taking, but we thought it was extremely important to do that, given how important it is to ensure that any offshore exploration activity that happens here is done safely and is done responsibly. Everybody here appreciates how important the ocean environment is to the

communities here in a way that I think is unique and not like anyplace else in the United States where people are very closely connected to the ocean. It is, I hear over and over -- and it's, in fact, true -- that the ocean is your garden. It's where you go for sustenance. It's where you go for subsistence. And that raises the stakes significantly in our minds. And we need to be protective of that, and any activity that goes forward in terms of oil and gas offshore needs to be held to the high standards. And that is the undertaking that we are involved in today.

And so thank you very much for attending, and I would really appreciate hearing anything you have to say. We have lots of time. You shouldn't feel constrained and you should, I hope, be willing to share with us whatever is on your mind.

The last point I'll make -- and I've said it before earlier today in our earlier session. I have tremendous appreciation and respect for each of you attending this hearing tonight. This is in part how our democracy works. It can feel bureaucratic. It can feel formal, unnecessarily formal, maybe, but this is our democracy at work. This is people interacting with their government to tell their government what we ought to be doing in order to protect the people. And so I appreciate

very much and I respect very much your willingness to participate in this democratic process.

So with that, I turn it over and I look forward to the most important part of the session, which is hearing from you. Thank you. --

MR. MIKE HALLER: Thank you,

7 Mr. Secretary. Willard, you are first up on the docket.

8 And while he's coming up, let me add that any of you are

welcome to come and share your ideas, opinions, concepts.

10 There is no wrong or right answer here. It's what you

11 have on your mind and in your hearts. So we invite you to

do that tonight. And I'll call -- we'll open it up as

MR. WILLARD NEAKOK: Thank you for coming up to Barrow to hear testimony about offshore drilling. My name is Willard Neakok, N-E-A-K-O-K. I'm the President of Point Lay IRA Council, which is federally recognized. That's one of many hats that I wear in my community. But, you know, ever since I started hearing about oil lease sales going on, you know, how many years ago, you know, and it just raised a red flag for me. You know, what are they going to do to our ocean? What's going to happen? What might happen.

And -- you know, I feel for those people down there at Prince William Sound, also, you know, down in

Louisiana with the Deepwater Horizon event. You know, I do not want to have that happen here. You know, ever since day one since I've heard about offshore drilling up here in our ocean, Chukchi Sea, which is only 75 miles from where the Burger prospect is -- we're halfway between here and Kotzebue, which is 83 miles from here, and you know, we are the closest impacted village, you know, to that Burger prospect.

Also talking about Burger prospect, you know, right there there is a shoal called Hannah Shoal and, you know, the walrus go there to feed on clams and whatever else they might go there for. And they spend about four or five days, maybe up to a week to feed. And as you heard, back in 2009 Point Lay had, you know, a walrus haul-out happen, you know, five miles north on our barrier island. And we inadvertently became stewards of those walrus because we did not want to have, you know, the media coming in. NBC sort of beat us to that, but we wanted only one, you know, media to come in and record, and everybody else can go off of that. But we made sure that there was no, you know, flights going in and out, tourists coming in. We are stewards.

And those are one of my hats that I wear, too.

I am a commissioner for the Eskimo Walrus Commission. We
meet at least twice a year in Anchorage or in Nome. And

you know, I am a hunter. I am a subsistence hunter. I go out to the ocean. I hunt seals. I hunt beluga. I hunt walrus. I hunt sea birds. And also I'm a crew member for one of our whaling crews down there, which consists of two whaling crews.

You know, I think of the future. What if something happens, not -- you know, like Prince William Sound. You know, I know the Deepwater Horizon event, you know, because the depth of the water around there is only like 175, 190 feet below the surface. But still, you know, any kind of oil spill that happens, you know, it jeopardizes the food chain. We lose one source of food, you know, microbes, and it goes further onto the krill. Krill, you know, feeds different animals, the ducks, whatever, and seal, and it goes further up the chain. And the whales, you know, they are air-breathing animals just like the beluga and the seal. You know, if they come upon a patch of oil and suck that oil into their lungs, you know, what happens then? You know, we lose whales.

You know, I -- I love our ocean. I want my grandchildren to do what I have enjoyed doing since 1973.

You know, I am an avid hunter. I go out every year. I'm only 58 years old, and 30 of those years have been here on the North Slope. Or I should say 40. And I want my children, my grandchildren to enjoy the things that I have

enjoyed. And if we lose the ocean, Chukchi Sea, you know,

we -- we lose another food that we subsist off of.

I hunt caribou. I hunt wolverines, wolves, bear, brown bear and polar bear but, you know, it doesn't taste more better from the ocean. It's natural. It's clean. You know, but even my grandkids love the food that I harvest, not only from the land, but also from the ocean.

You know, it just -- I sure hate to see the worst case scenario like what happened in Prince William Sound. Those people are still -- I don't know how you might say it -- recovering. But yet, you know, you dig down two feet and there is still oil remnants, hydrocarbons still underneath.

We have 11 inlets that -- you know, we are accessible to the ocean. We live on the mainland, but we have Kasegaluk Lagoon, which is an 80-mile stretch of lagoon that goes from the foothills down south about 30 miles from our village all the way up to near Wainwright, which is considered the longest lagoon in the world. And there are 11 inlets. And every year we have birds migrating from down south coming up and utilize that lagoon. The walrus use that lagoon to get out of storms that happen in the ocean because I've witnessed it quite a few times during my 40 years. The belugas go in there

and, you know, as well as, you know, ducks, geese. We have a wide variety of waterfowl that utilize that lagoon.

And you know, if oil happens to, you know, worst case scenario, have an oil spill, it's going to jeopardize that lagoon. We utilize that lagoon every year. We go all the way up to Icy Cape, sometimes even all the way to Wainwright. You know, it's sort of like a somewhat safe trail in case the ocean is too rough to travel. We utilize that lagoon to harvest caribou along the mainland shore. We harvest off of the barrier island that is there. We harvest eggs, which is going on right now this time of year. You know, we don't have to go to the store to buy eggs. You know, there is a wide variety of seagulls, geese, ducks, terns.

You know, we subsist off the land. We subsist off the ocean. If we lose that ocean, what is going to happen? Is the federal government to do -- do a thing like -- or Shell is going to provide money to each and every resident to offset the cost of food? That's what's going on in Prince William Sound, Cordova. Those are the things that I think about. I sure hate to be one of those recipients like down there in the Cordova area or the Prince William Sound area where, you know, none of the wildlife has begun to come back yet because of the sheen or smell.

You know, fish are -- fish are very sensitive to smell just like, you know, birds and everything. They know something is wrong. And that's why -- I think that's why Prince William Sound, there is hardly anything going on down there right now after 26 years, not only from -- you know, Exxon Valdez ran aground. You know, what's going to happen if they try to, you know, take this stuff to the Lower 48 or build a pipeline from the west coast to Trans-Alaska Pipeline and we have a spill? Not only in the ocean, but maybe a spill along the way, you know, that's going to jeopardize the waterfowl that we have, the endangered birds that we have there, spectacled eiders.

You know, there is a lot at stake here because -- you know, I'm not only speaking for myself, but I'm also speaking for our village of Point Lay, which also is -- the majority of people there, you know, are against offshore drilling, not to mention if they do have an oil spill, you know, we have currents out there that can carry that water, that oil-soaked water down to the Bering Sea, and it's going to be affecting, you know, those communities; not only us, but our Russian counterparts and maybe, you know, Greenland or Norway or whatever. Just in case, you know, they are unable to cap, like what happened down there in Louisiana with the Deepwater Horizon, you know, it's going to be affecting a lot of people along the

coast.

I love the coast. I love to travel by snowmachine, but mostly by boat, you know, to see the wonderful things that God has provided for not only me but, you know, the Inupiat people all across the Slope.

I'm not only talking about the west side, but I talk about, you know, Nuiqsut and Kaktovik because, you know, I am very against offshore drilling. I hate to see what might happen in the future, what's going to happen in case worst case scenario if you have an oil spill.

But I believe, you know, if there is going to be drilling, I know the United States and the world needs hydrocarbons to keep gas, diesel, whatever to keep our outboards going, our cars, our trucks, our power plants. I know the demand that is needed but, you know, let's stay off the ocean, especially in Chukchi and Beaufort Sea. Let's drill on land first. Who knows how much more oil is underneath the ground first? You know, hopefully, you know we find -- oil companies or whoever goes and looks for oil, I hope they find everything on land, because I don't want to see oil rigs like I do down there in Cook Inlet, oil rigs here and there. Our ice gets pretty thick, but nowadays with global warming we might even start seeing oil rigs here and there.

Shell, ConocoPhillips, as the Secretary has

mentioned, and Repsol, three different companies that wants to put platforms out there and start pumping out the oil. I know the world needs fuel but, like I said earlier, do it on land first because it jeopardizes the food that we subsist off of each and every year. And I want to have my grandchildren enjoy that, too, like I mentioned earlier.

I just want to thank you for your time. And if I have anything more, hopefully I can come back up here and, you know, speak what I may have forgotten. With this old age, you know, it's pretty easy to forget some things. But you know, I just don't want to forget that what I can do for my grandchildren today, you know, that will affect their lives tomorrow. So thank you for your time.

MR. MIKE HALLER: Thank you, Willard.

Ladies and gentlemen, a few more have joined us since we began, and I would make the same offer for everyone. That is, if you have not signed up to come and speak, you are welcome to come and speak. And we will start with a volunteer. Anybody like to step forward? Please, ma'am. Thank you very much.

MS. MARTY AWALIN: I'm from the same village as Willard. I'm the President and CEO for Cully Corporation, the Native Village corporation of Point Lay.

MR. MIKE HALLER: Thanks for coming down.

MS. MARTY AWALIN: I missed the hearing in Anchorage, so I was here in Barrow, so I decided I should stay longer and give you my -- some of my aches and pains regarding this oil drilling that I'm -- some of the issues we face with those. One thing is I want it noted that Point Lay is on the Chukchi Sea coast, as all the other villages of Point Hope, Wainwright and Barrow. And I want it noted that these are private lands all along the Chukchi Sea side, and I have not seen any industry come and work directly with the corporation because of these private lands we have also.

And as Willard stated out the concerns of Point
Lay, Kasegaluk Lagoon -- and also Fish & Wildlife gave it
a different name as Ledyard Bay. And within Ledyard Bay
there is a lot of stipulations in regards to it being a
sanctuary for the Steller's eider ducks, and it has
created a problem for us. And with the oil drilling going
on, our hand is forced on this. The corporation is forced
to deal, and proactively -- we decided we are going to
have to approach this proactively.

And being proactive, one of the things we wanted to do was see that our community is trained in oil spill response. But when speaking to Shell Oil, they said they could not do anything within the Ledyard Bay area because of the Steller's eiders being -- being that is a Steller's

eider sanctuary in that area. So therefore Shell, got dinged. I guess they got fined for being too close to the Ledyard Bay lagoon this past -- last summer. So with that concern, on that basis they have to send our people to Wainwright for oil spill response training. And it really bothers me. We cannot allow our own community in Point Lay to have training for oil spill response.

so we need help on this one. I shouldn't have to send local people to train how to put out a boom, you know, out in Wainwright when, you know, Point Lay is of concern to us. So I know we are close to the NPR-A boundary. I think Point Lay should be given status as -- as an NPR-A boundary with all the other villages. So with that, that would help also our community. And not only the community, but also the tribal government to receive some kind of funding for whether there would be training or if they need some type of response, you know, funding for that community.

It needs to be -- it needs that status as well, because, as Willard says, we are 93 miles out of ConocoPhillips' leases, 120 miles out of Shell's lease tracts on the Chukchi Sea. So we need some -- we need help in getting this village the same status. We need it because if an oil spill occurs, one of the things -- one of the traditional hunters tell me if a west wind occurs,

if an oil spill happens -- God forbid, I hope it never does -- the west wind -- if the west wind were to occur, it would go directly to our community. So that's one of the concerns I want to bring to this.

And now after reading the Shell Oil response plan that they have, you know, Point Lay or Point Hope, you know, is not in that spill response. We see a lot of Wainwright and Barrow. You know, we are in the same vicinity as Wainwright and as Barrow. So we would like to see Point Hope and Point Lay cooperate. I'm not speaking for Point Hope, but I think because they are being on Chukchi -- they are being located on the Chukchi Sea side, they should be listed on that oil spill response. It bothered me so much that I did not see much of Point Lay on that oil spill response.

And also one of the things that was mentioned was infrastructure. I know there is a lot of concern in regards to infrastructure within the communities. And I want to see whether -- how or where we could work -- the communities could work as far as the planning. If this were to occur, we are in need of infrastructure within our communities. And I'd like to see some -- at least visit the villages. There is a lot of you here in Barrow a lot, but come to the communities, too, because they do have concerns, too, as I do. And we will -- as a corporation,

1 you know, we want to be in preparation for all of this.

2 And it seems like we are -- we are not being listed on

3 like the oil spill response as a community. You know, it

seems like it puts a road block up to -- for the oil

5 companies to come and talk to us.

You know, I see Wainwright a lot listed on that oil spill response and, boy, everybody is going over there. And I say what about Point Lay, you know, because we are not so much listed in that oil spill response, and it bothered me. They need to come to our community. We need to be listed on there. And we want to make sure that we are going to be protected.

And like I said, our hand is -- our hand is forced when the government let out the leases. So therefore, we want to be proactive on this, I do, as a corporation, because our corporate lands are going to be affected. We are on the coastline.

And one other thing I wanted to mention, with the concerns of what happened in Valdez versus what happened in Gulf of Mexico, there is a big difference when it comes to ocean, the way the ocean is -- one is cooler and one is warmer. And I know to date I have done a lot of study in regards to that -- what happened in Valdez, Prince William Sound, you know. And the emissions are still coming out of that -- the oil that's on the bottom

of the ocean, you know, and I've done -- I do my homework
because it worries me that, you know, when Shell could
not -- did not -- could not come to our community to do
oil spill response or train our people, it worried me.

something in there for the village of Point Lay and also that the village be also be placed on that oil spill response more so as Wainwright because we are -- you know, if a pipeline were to go near our village, then we will have a lot of great more concern. And we want to make sure this is done correctly and the village corporation and village of Point Lay also be -- take part in some of your community meetings. Come to the community. They are not going to do any harm to you. They will probably talk your head off, but it's all right. At least give them a chance.

MR. MIKE HALLER: Thank you, Marty. We have fond memories of being there, actually. Thank you.

Okay. Ma'am, you would like to step forward? Thank you.

If you would introduce yourself, spell your name for

Mary's benefit and ours. Thanks.

MS. KATHY LEARY: Kathy Leary,

L-E-A-R-Y. I'm the training manager for community and
workforce development at Ilasagvik College. We do a lot
of short-term trainings. We do a lot of trainings with

industry. And so I have a question, if you wouldn't mind, and then -- and then a statement. I noticed in here you talked about continued strong coordination across government agencies is essential. So I guess I'm curious because we have worked with, like, NOAA and NMFS and some of the other agencies in trying to develop and deliver trainings for residents for marine mammal observers and for spill response and for all kinds of regulatory required certifications.

And so how do you anticipate this coordination so there aren't different regulations coming at the process from the different agencies? I'm just curious about that process.

MR. TOMMY BEAUDREAU: Yeah. This is something that kind of goes back a couple years with respect to Alaska in particular where in the context of originally, you know, proposals from Shell on drilling. We brought together, you know, NOAA, the Interior Department agencies, EPA, the Coast Guard, all sort of the relevant agencies that have authority, statutory authorities that touch on this type of activity so that we could be much more coordinated in terms of both our regulatory process and also our expectations vis-a-vis Shell so we would have sort of one federal family face to Shell and not sort of have this circumstance where the

left hand doesn't know what the right is doing and that sort of thing.

But that was all aligned, and so that worked reasonably well. We did a lot of work to figure that out. But it was all aligned against or, you know, with -- you know, it was all sort of directed around a project proposal, a proposal from Shell to conduct drilling.

What we would like to do -- you see sort of lists of different sort of recent reports. A running theme across all of those reports is this idea of working in Alaska on a more strategic level, on an integrated -what we call in the Interior Department integrated Arctic management level so that we break down sort of silos across government agencies and not think about the Arctic and northern Alaska, Alaska in general on a project-by-project basis, but rather have a much broader perspective, do scenario planning that considers, okay, oil and gas is happening here, there is vessel traffic that has an effect here, that has impacts on communities and how communities interact with that type of activity. These areas are important for caribou herds. We need to look at that and protect that. And so start really thinking about the landscape as a whole and working as a federal family in order to do that, in close consultation, of course, with local communities as we go.

So that is the aspiration. That's where we would like to get to. And so coordination is one thing. And we actually, you know, are doing that pretty well. We really want to take it philosophically to a much broader level. And that's what that is all about.

Next week you are going to hear -- I'm actually coming back. I will only make it as far as Anchorage next week. But I'll be with a number of high-level officials, including from the White House, to talk exactly that. And so again, if any of you happen to be in Anchorage next week or are able to tune in, that's going to be what the discussion is going to be next week about this kind of much higher, more strategic, much more landscaped level approach to Alaska.

MS. KATHY LEARY: Okay. Well, I really appreciate being able to understand that a little better, because it has been a little bit sort of scattered from year to year, and it makes programming efforts and training efforts a little bit more difficult in order to do that.

So with that, one of the things we try to do as the State's only tribal college up here is incorporate Inupiat values across our curriculum. And when we did initially develop the marine mammal observer program, we had traditional knowledge components built into that

curriculum, as well as the sciences of, you know, the research pieces. So we would like to continue with that effort in other -- other training endeavors where we incorporate those pieces into -- as well as the regulatory pieces.

So recognizing that that's sort of our mission,
I would encourage you and your agencies to work with us in
whatever you are putting together and maybe work with us
when it comes to some of the planning of the regulatory
issues and what that might look like so we are able to
help ready people and deal with concerns such as Marty's
and other folks out there because we are the training arm
up here, and the more we can focus our efforts on being
responsive in a manner that will allow for local hire and
so forth, the better we are all are, if that makes sense.

MR. TOMMY BEAUDREAU: Yeah, absolutely. That's really helpful.

MS. KATHY LEARY: Okay. Thank you.

MR. MICHAEL HALLER: Thanks so much.

Appreciate it. Next, please? Anyone else?

As you come up, thank you for your service, sir.

Thank you for your service. Flag Day is coming up this

coming week, folks. Just want to point that out.

MR. NATHANIEL OLEMAUN, JR.: My name is

Nathaniel Olemaun, Jr. I'm a whaling captain. My crew is

still out whaling. And I belong to -- I am a member of the Native Village of Barrow and shareholder of the Arctic Slope Regional Corporation and shareholder of UIC. And I reside in North Slope Borough and City of Barrow. I made notes of what was being presented. Also I'm mayor emeritus for the City of Barrow. I was mayor for 30 years, so welcome to Barrow.

I want to talk about OCS, which is -- which was removed as a power for City of Barrow because we used to have three-mile limit. Now, when they inserted 200 miles for OCS, it took the power away from City of Barrow and North Slope Borough to participate in development, which we did not want offshore. And we concur with North Slope Borough to develop within the barrier islands like in Prudhoe. But they made a road connecting those once they put those islands on. For our region, it hurt us for our whaling activities, which we treasure very dearly, and it's a traditional culture up here. And we are aware of the ice conditions, as you can see right now, and we watch it year-round.

And we want to work together with different entities here with the government. Ice condition is slow -- has slowed down our whaling season, yet our crews are still going out to hunt whales. We work with International Whaling Commission for hunt every year,

which we get a quota from them. We just got one here at the last meeting. As a whaling captain, we are still whaling for our community.

Because the blanket toss is associated with whaling, we conduct it traditionally, it brings our community together for a successful feast. At the time we land a whale, feasts are held at the captain's residence with the people. When we bring up the boat, feast is provided for the community again. Blanket toss is held, and again we serve with the community muktuk and meat. Also serve and share with the communities during Thanksgiving feast and Christmas feast. We share with the community again. And we share it also with the outlying villages.

We -- we hunt beluga whales, which they are trying to stop us from hunting. They are working on walrus and they have put a condition on the polar bears, which we all hunt up here. We need to work together with you, but we need representation. The government entities are up here, but there is no elected officials or local residents from the Slope to sit amongst you guys, but we need that representation.

As you can see, the ice hasn't been out since it came in in December. There is no boat harbor up here in the North Slope, and we need that. There is no way

this summer to bring their rigs up here, and that was in 2 open water, and this is -- what we have is ice year-round. 3 And we -- we need to know what kind of safety procedures 4 they will have to drill, where they'll have a Native 5 observer from the North Slope working with them. 6 7 companies do that. They work with the Native observers. 8 And thanks again. Okay. 9 MR. MICHAEL HALLER: Thank you very much, 10 sir. 11 MS. MARTHA ITTA: My name is Martha Itta, tribal administrator for the Native village of 12 13 Nuigsut. I'd like to thank you guys for coming and listening to -- for putting a face to our voices. 14 15 first of all, I know you guys heard concerns about equipment needing -- being needed here on the North Slope. 16 My concern -- I will keep it short because I probably have 17 18 a whole booklet of comments and concerns for my village of

But my concerns that I want to put out right now is our evacuation plan. We do not have an effective evacuation plan, being surrounded by development. We have

no equipment. We -- that is something that our entities are trying to work together to put together, but without equipment or without funding, we cannot do anything about the evacuation plan.

As you may have heard, we have experienced two blowouts in two winters. One was last year in February and one was this year, by the industry Repsol, which caused a lot of chaos. We had no -- nobody to turn to. I mean, everybody wasn't -- there was nobody to help us. And you know, having no equipment or no effective evacuation plan, there was a lot of panic in our community. So I would like to stress that you guys not give any more leases, sell any more leases until you guys have put in place the very important thing that needs to be in place to protect us.

The other thing is our air monitoring. We need a full air monitoring, I mean, not just the bare minimum that they have been doing for the last 15, 20, 30 years since Prudhoe Bay Alpine. That is something that really needs, given that after the blowout last year we had done our own air monitoring testing, and from those testings, we had found that there has been nine VOCs, chemicals in the air that's never been picked up before. And we were in exceedance of the chemical benzene, which causes leukemia into our children. And we have two children that

were treated and one lost. We had lost a two-year old to leukemia.

And I would really strongly suggest that you guys get our air monitoring going before any more leases are being sold because that is -- that's the only resources we have in protecting ourselves, our children.

I would also like to ask there not be any leasing by Camden Bay. That is where our whales feed. That is where our whalers go. We have -- our whalers have to travel to Cross Island, and our whales feed at Camden Bay. And we would like to ask that there be no leasing around that area.

The last thing I would like to concern -- I would like to say that Shell's presence here in Barrow deeply impacted not only Barrow, but our community because their presence here in Barrow, they took all the housing, all the hotels, and our people could not come because Barrow is the main hub for our health care. And I would like to stress that they made a big impact just being here in Barrow because our people could not come to Barrow to be seen. So they were left home. Cannot come to Barrow because there is no housing. And that -- that's a big issue.

We had a lot of sick people after the blowouts, after the oil spill, and the antibiotics that are given

are not working. And that's -- that's -- that's a big
issue. That's a big concern with the industry being not
only here in Barrow, but the villages. It impacts our
health care because Barrow is a main hub for all outlying
villages.

And if there is anything else I have, I will turn in by comment. And thank you guys for your guys' time in being here and listening to our concerns. Thank you.

MR. MICHAEL HALLER: Thanks, Martha and we will look forward to chatting with you next week. Okay.

Do we have someone else? Thank you, sir.

MR. PATRICK SUVLU: Good evening. My name is Patrick Suvlu, and I'm a -- I'm born and raised in Barrow. And my concern is that the offshore drilling here, and I want to make -- I want to make sure you guys understand, the usage of the whale, when they say we -- they divide the whale up during Thanksgiving and Christmas, everybody goes to church, and that's where they deliver the whale and whale meat, muktuk during Thanksgiving and also on Christmas. I just wanted to make sure you guys understand that, what the whale is used for and stuff.

But my main concern is the offshore drilling.

And when Shell had a community concern meeting, they had

informed us that they could dismantle their rigs in less than an hour in 60-mile-an-hour winds. And last fall they were coming in and Shell was going to -- or whoever was out on that rig, there was only 30-knot winds, and it took them most of the day or night to dismantle -- get their personnel off and dismantle their rigs from the ocean.

Now, they got -- our oceans are different up here. We got a lot of currents and we got choppy waters. We don't have big swells like they do in the Gulf of Mexico and in the Gulf of Alaska. But our waves are close together, a lot more close together than the swells they have down there. So if they have a boat out there, it's going to keep hitting the -- getting thrown around by the choppy waves out there. So -- and when they actually tried to dismantle their rig and get their personnel off, it took them mostly all day and all night.

So that was what -- what Shell said, it looked good on paper, but actually it didn't work as good as it sounded on paper. So that is my concern about our ocean and comparing them down to the Gulf of Mexico and the Gulf of Alaska where they have swells and we got choppy waters up here, waves and -- waves are close to each other and they toss that boat around more than they do it down in the Gulf of Mexico and in Gulf of Alaska or down -- down there.

That was my concern. Thank you.

2 MR. MIKE HALLER: Thank you very much, 3 sir. Do we have -- yes, sir, please come forward.

MR. BRYAN NUKAPIGAK: Hello. My name
Bryan Nukapigak. That's N-U-K-A-P-I-G-A-K. I'm from
Nuiqsut Alaska, and I work on the Prudhoe Bay oil fields
and Alpine oil fields since '99. But I'm 33 years old.
I'm from Nuiqsut, Alaska, and I've hunted these waters up
here for 30 years. Since I was three years old I have
been in these waters. And I call it my home. Being stuck
on land for ten months out of the year, I love going to
the ocean every year. And it's what I look forward to
since I was a kid.

And everybody is speaking about concerns of offshore drilling, but what I would like to talk about is the effects that I have witnessed what offshore drilling does.

Back in '95, my second and third year of whaling, we did not catch no whales that year because of the onshore drillings, the noise that it makes. We traveled 72 miles from Nuiqsut to do our subsistence whaling. And out of that 72 miles, we have to go another additional five to 20 miles. And that's within a good year. But in that year, we did not get no whales. We were traveling anywhere between 20 to 40 miles.

And like my sister said, Martha -- that's my sister -- she mentioned Camden Bay. That is where our whales feed on their migration route. That is one of their best feeding grounds that I have been taught where to go in case we don't find whales. And there have been a lot of times where we have to do that, go out there and try and spot them, but we won't catch them when they're that far out. We just go there and observe and see where they are out.

A lot of the effects of these offshore drilling -- because we are sounded by so many of them already in the village of Nuiqsut, and the three potential drilling sites that they have over there -- is that a lot of our animals are being affected. We have to travel a lot farther.

And when they are doing their seismic -- another experience that I've had last year -- I've never seen -- in the 30 years I have been going out to the ocean when they are doing their seismic, they are setting buoys out into where they are going to be doing their seismic, and that is right in our area where we do our subsistence hunting for seals, bearded seals, and our ducks.

And there is a lot -- and the areas where we hunt is another migration route for our fish that comes into the Colville River, as well. And a lot of these

fish, it brings in a lot of these chemicals into our rivers as well as to what they are putting into the waters or whatever they are drilling with.

A lot of these affect a lot of our hunters financially, as well. When we have no animals, it makes us to go out and travel further to look for game, and that makes it more dangerous for us. And like he said, our weather, it gets unpredictable at times. It may seem like it's going to be good, and it can turn within an instant. And that makes it more dangerous for us if we have to go further out to look for our sea mammals that we so depend on so much, because where I come from, at least 85 percent of our food that goes onto the table comes from the ocean. And everybody loves it, all the way to the little babies, our Elders.

And it's just -- everybody is speaking of climate, but I just want to talk about the effects that I've witnessed in the 33 years of my life. And I have been hunting in these waters since I was three years old, and these are the effects that I've witnessed myself.

What preventative maintenance will we have to where we have to subsist around you guys working on our waters, and with -- like that year when I found all those buoys out there when they were doing that seismic, I had no idea that they were doing that out there. And it was

in the general area of where we go. And these buoys, I have found them anywhere between five miles to 25 miles north of the Colville River.

And it's just -- for us that could be a danger for some -- some boaters out there if they are not paying attention or sometimes -- some of these buoys are small and you can't see them, and you are riding your boat along, and that could damage your outboard motor, and then you have to call in for search and rescue.

And if this is anything else like this going to be happening, we would like to be informed of where they are doing their job sites, their seismic, where they are setting their buoys out in our waters where we are at. That way nobody has to come across and running their outboard motors into these buoy lines because they are pretty long. I picked one of them up to see what they were, and I followed some of their trails. We could see some of their buoys going out, and that's how we finally found one of their ships out there that was setting them. It would be nice if we would be informed of what they are doing out there where we hunt in our general areas.

Thank you.

MR. MICHAEL HALLER: You are welcome.

Thank you very much. Yes, sir. Please.

MR. RONALD FISCHER: Good evening, and

welcome. My name is Ronald Fischer. I'm from Barrow, born and raised here in Barrow. I'm a lifelong resident, and I'm here to stay. I currently work for Umiak. I'm the community liaison, and I have been working with Shell, also. I'm kind of like the representative for Shell here in Barrow. So we do have an office over here in town, and we are not hard to find. So it's over there on the third floor in the bank building in town. So even though I'm not at the office, I'm either at my house. My doors are always open. So I just thought I'd introduce myself.

Born and raised in Barrow. I have been whaling ever since I have been growing up here in Barrow. I'm an ASRC shareholder, UIC shareholder, tribal member of the Native Village of Barrow. I also have inherited shares in the Olgoonik Corporation in Wainwright on behalf of my mother, so Wainwright is like my second home.

And now there is always a lot of concern that I hear as being a CLO here and all the concerns that people have. Their concerns are my concerns, so we're always looking forward to hearing everybody's input, you know.

So I'm here in Barrow. There are representatives here, and I'll leave you guys my card. So I just thought I'd come and introduce myself. Thank you.

MR. MIKE HALLER: Thank you, sir. Anyone else like to offer remarks? Please. Thank you.

MR. BEN GLOVER: Ben Glover, Dean of

Community and Workforce Development for Ilasagvik College,

although my remarks are as a private citizen of Barrow. I

was not born and raised in Barrow, but Barrow is where

5 I've decided to raise my family and children and purchase

a home, and it is the community which we call home.

And I have issues sort of with the structure of this discussion because I have been to a number of these meetings and, you know, you start off with -- you know, the first place in this one you went to was Anchorage and you are coming back to Anchorage next week, but I'm pretty sure if there was an oil spill in the Chukchi Sea, there would not be any oil landing on the beaches of Anchorage. I've flown up and down the Chukchi Sea a number of times. I haven't seen Anchorage there. Maybe I was on the wrong side of the plane, but anyway --

The discussion is always this is how we are going to mitigate the risk. This is how we are going to mitigate the risk. This is how we are going to mitigate the risk. But at the risk of being flip, that's like playing the game of Russian roulette when you are going to mitigate the risk by removing bullets so there are fewer bullets that will be spinning in the chamber. You can't remove all of them. Much it's not possible. You are dealing with forces beyond your control that will never

bring down the risk to zero.

And similarly to Russian roulette, there is no upside. There is only reducing the downside risk. There is, so far as I can tell and so far as I've ever heard in any of these meetings, no upside for the community, whether that be where the oil leases lay and therefore, you know, what the taxing authority is and how it's not the North Slope Borough and, you know, whether that we are training in some communities but we are not going to train in all communities. I'm just -- I've yet to hear in any one of these what the upside for the very communities that are put at risk.

You know, if there is a spill, it will be Point Lay, Wainwright, Barrow, to a more limited degree Point Hope, Nuiqsut that are directly affected by that. And it's unlikely that we are going to stop the progress. The decision is being made outside of our hands and these are probably going to go forward whether we want it or not. It's certainly not something we are going to have a vote on.

But if I'm investing my money, I -- you know,
I'm not going to take an offer, well, there is three
chances: You can lose all your money, you can lose half
your money, or you could not lose any money. You wouldn't
do that. That's not something normal people in normal

circumstances would accept. But that's, you know, the choices that we kind of are being offered up here, you know. Congratulations, we are going to make there be a smaller chance that we are going to ruin the environment, ruin your hunting, ruin many different things. And no, we are still not going to improve your communities for just exposing -- you know, this is for negotiation.

You know, okay, so we have to accept that you are going to expose us to risk. What -- what is -- for lack of a better tact, what's in it for us? There is just nothing. It's all mitigating risk, which is -- we are all appreciative. We are all appreciative as you are -- every group that comes through is attempting to mitigate the risk. You know, lowering the risk is definitely a good thing, but that's all it is is risk, as far as I see it.

And I will admit that I don't know everything about it and haven't read everything there is to it, but it's the theme of each and every one of these meetings I have been at. Thank you for your time.

MR. MICHAEL HALLER: Thank you very much, sir. Let me ask, anyone else like to come forward and offer some remarks, comments? We have some time here. Thank you very much.

MS. EDITH VORDERSTRASSE: Good evening, and welcome to Barrow. I'm Edith Vorderstrasse. I

currently work for UIC Umiak as the consulting division manager. We have been very -- we have been working with the industry in the stakeholder engagement portion of their permitting, and also we travel with them on their planned cooperation meetings, So over the years I have listened to the concerns of the villages that are -- where Shell goes throughout the Chukchi Sea through the Beaufort.

We have many concerns. I'm a former mayor of City of Barrow. I was born and raised here. And I still have family here, and I still call Barrow my home. And I remember you, Mr. Beaudreau, when the late Eileen MacLean was in our House of Representatives because I worked for her.

The concern that most of our villages have is health, safety, and the impact that it will bring and how -- how well are we prepared as communities, the infrastructure that will have to be built. And having worked with the industry and UIC and its companies, this is what we have -- we have been -- this is our marching order with UIC. As long as it's done in an environmentally safe manner and that our people, our communities will economically benefit. That's the marching order that we have, that I have with the company I work for.

And when I was first asked to go and work for OCS on behalf of OCS, I was very reluctant because I said that is where we get our food from. And I said, I don't think I could do this. And when I went through an interview process in Anchorage with one of our competitors, I said, I don't think I could do this. And then the people who wanted to hire me said okay. They gave me a couple days to think about it and said, okay, if you can help implement protective measures and speak on protective measures of the ocean, the land, your community, can you do this is the question that they asked me. And I said, yes, I can, if it -- if I can help in that manner.

And our communities have always been very involved with industry or any -- any industry or any people with lease sales, as someone spoke this morning, minerals management. I have testified in front of them before, giving them options. And the frustrating part there is we spill our guts out, we tell them what we want. We say, no, we don't want you to do this -- this plan. We would prefer if we can -- I mean, we team together. We meet with the communities of the North Slope, the city, the borough, the wildlife department; we would sit down and meet and talk about what was coming before us on the lease sale. And we would say we would -- we want you to

do this, this instead of that. Can we meet halfway.

experienced over the last 30 some years. And I am very thankful that part of the government is finally stepping up to the plate to listen to some of the concerns or all our concerns, that you are here to spend some time and listen to the concerns of the people of the North Slope or areas that will be impacted.

My question to you is: What can Department of Interior do to help any -- any organization, any State that is along the coastal zone in getting revenues from these oil leases.

You heard earlier today that we receive impact aid funds from NPR-A. Yes, we do. But those are all -- those are already spoken for. The State gets a part and we get a part, but what do we -- what do we get? The risk that the communities are taking is tremendous. And there are communities, as you heard earlier today, that are struggling, that are impacted by this. And we as community leaders need to look on behalf of our villages to make sure that we benefit from this because we will still be here when the industry leaves. And hopefully they will be here a while.

But these are things that we have to take into consideration. It's not something very lightly that we

take. But I want to -- when you say that you will reach out to the -- the villages or whomever will be impacted, that's a beginning. But my -- my -- my question to you is with your listening ears, what you have heard here and in Anchorage and wherever you may conduct your meetings, how much of that will you listen to? And that's -- that's my question to you. And how can you help?

I know there has been legislation introduced to receive revenue sharing from OCS. There has been opposition. And there will be opposition because the federal government is not willing to give up that money. And that's a question that I have to you, also, is how can you help us to get legislation passed so that our communities can receive the revenue sharing that they -- they deserve? Because we are the impacted communities, even though it's outside the three-mile limit.

But those are questions that I keep asking myself. And I follow revenue sharing, and it's been introduced how many times, and it hasn't gone anywhere. But what is the Department of Interior willing to do to help reassure us that we can get revenues from OCS?

MR. TOMMY BEAUDREAU: If I may, I think it's a great point. It was a point you were making, too. And it's actually a point that was first made to me a couple years ago during a public hearing similar to this

in Point Hope. And it was a whaling captain's wife who stood up and spoke very passionately and compellingly about exactly that, that you know, we are a subsistence-based community, we bear all of the risk of a catastrophe that would impact us, not only in a way that -- like in the Gulf where it impacts, you know, certain industries like fishing and tourism, but it would be a real human catastrophe in terms of impacting in a catastrophic way where people get their food. And so it would be a human catastrophe on a level different than what anyplace else in the United States would experience from something like this.

And again, unlike someplace in the Gulf of Mexico, as bad as the Deepwater Horizon spill was, the people -- a lot of people in Louisiana who were experiencing, you know, an environmental disaster were pushing us to lift the moratorium on deep water drilling so that drilling could continue because that was -- in large part is a fundamental aspect of their economy. And so even while the spill was still going on and that well was flowing, they were pushing us for more drilling because a lot of their jobs come from that. You grow up in Louisiana, go to SU, you get a petroleum engineering degree, and you have a job for life working on this rig. Again, it's not like that here.

And so that made a big impression on me hearing that. And I spoke with then Secretary Salazar about that, and I came back and said, look, I heard this. You know, it's pretty compelling. It's something that I've already talked to Secretary Jewell, our new Secretary, about.

Revenue sharing is, as you indicated, incredibly complex. The State is involved. The federal government is involved and, as you put it, you know, not, you know willing, to give up revenue dollars very lightly. But my personal view and something I've talked with both of the Secretaries about is it's a pretty compelling case. You know, what is the upside on these communities for activity? There may be upside generally, energy security, all of those things, resource development that may be good for the country if it can be done the right way, but for the local communities, what is in it for them. I think that is a very compelling issue.

There is -- I can't promise -- sitting here now, I can't promise something specific we can do about it, but I think it is an issue that I put on our Secretary's radar screen so that when those conversations are happening people understand the concerns of the communities here and the communities' perspective here. That I can promise to do. So --

MS. EDITH VORDERSTRASSE: And earlier

Agreement, there are some industry groups that have not -well, they have not signed the Conflict Avoidance
Agreement, but Shell has also stepped up to the plate in
reference to the Beaufort Sea where they -- where they
said they would have zero discharge. And that has been
working with Nuiqsut whalers and also Kaktovik whalers.
That was a big step, and it has created a standard for
other industry groups who wish to be in the Beaufort side,
and I welcome that challenge.

And these are the kind of challenges that will benefit our whalers, will benefit the Chukchi side to where it will protect Camden Bay where our bowhead whales go and feed and calf. And so that's a good sign. And I challenge the other industry groups to follow along in reference to some of the changes that our people are asking.

Our Barrow Whaling Captains's Association -whether it's the Barrow Whaling Captain's Association or
any other whaling captain's association, our first
priority is to make sure that our sea mammals, our fish
are protected because that is our livelihood.

And I thank you for coming and thank you for listening. And hopefully we will see some positive things come out of this. And we wish to continue to work with

you in these areas as long as you have a listening ear and you are willing to do as you have heard. Thank you.

MR. MIKE HALLER: Thank you so much. It only seems as though almost everybody has spoken tonight. I know there are a few that may want to offer some remarks who may not have, or perhaps somebody would like seconds, so I leave that to you at this point in the evening. If someone would like to step forward to make some remarks, the time is yours, please.

MR. JOSHUA BACON: Good evening,
everyone, including the Barrow community. My name is -first of all, my name is Joshua Bacon. I'm a past
full-time resident of Barrow. Now I'm just a seasonal
guy. I also was a past biologist for the North Slope
Borough, but I'm not here to represent my past or current
employers at all. I just wanted to make that clear. I
also wanted to say good evening to the Barrow residents
and let them know that these guys are here. This is your
opportunity to let the Department of Interior know what
regulations you want to see in place for offshore. So
come on out to the City Hall if you have a moment.

Let's see. So I'm not here to represent anybody in particular. I guess, you know, I'm here because I'm a lover of Arctic wildlife, subsistence for Alaskans, Inupiat culture and Inupiat villages. And I think it's

important to say a couple of things here.

My first point is -- or actually really my only point, I had a really hard time with the events that happened in 2012, which I think were mentioned here in the introduction, the ships running aground. I think it was completely unacceptable. And it was an accident. And it makes everyone very fearful to see those accidents happen because it's easy to make the jump to see that accident happening with oil involved and seeing a spill. And when we are dealing with entities like Shell Oil, we know that monetary fines are not that effective. And it was really good for me to see that there was actually suspensions involved, I believe, if I'm correct, as a consequence of those accidents. And I'd like to see more of that.

When accidents happen, more meaningful consequences like year-long suspensions, two-year long suspensions, five-year long suspensions, something that will really get the attention of the industry. When we use monetary fines, we are talking about companies that are worth 200-billion dollars, 300-billion dollars, it's not going to mean much. And so as far as regulatory suggestions, that's mine. Meaningful consequences.

Thank you. That's all I had.

MR. MIKE HALLER: Thanks very much. Now we are down to a few that are left who haven't spoken.

You don't have to, but we would sure love to hear from you. Anybody? Anybody? Seconds? Thirds? Okay. Well, Mr. Secretary, it looks as though those who wish to give voice tonight have, and so I would turn the time for your summary, if you would like.

MR. TOMMY BEAUDREAU: Thank you very much, and thank you for the really heartfelt and genuine comments that we heard. You know, it does come through loud and clear and it always has to me ever since I have been involved working on these issues in Alaska how strongly folks feel about these issues and how directly affected people feel by the potential for oil and gas exploration and development off of your communities. And so that is why I take these issues and everybody you see here takes these issues extremely seriously.

As an Alaskan myself, it is extremely important for me to spend as much time as I can here talking to the people who are actually closest to these issues. And so I just want to say, as I did at the outset, how appreciative I am that you have taken time out on a Friday night to come here and put your hearts on your sleeves and tell me what is on your mind.

We do use this information. You know, I have been taking notes. Mary has been taking verbatim notes.

And we take this information back. And here is how we use

it. We sit down as we prepare, you know, these draft rules and we talk amongst ourselves and we say, okay, well, remember in Barrow when we heard this? What are we doing about it? What's our answer? If we get asked why did you or didn't you do something in response to something you heard, what is our answer? Because we can't always -- believe me, it's sort of impossible, given the views here, whatever we do it's not going to completely satisfy everyone. It's not going to be exactly what everyone hoped to see.

But what I do think we owe people is an answer to that question, how did you consider my input. And so we take it extremely seriously. I think, you know, the burden is on us to demonstrate how seriously we take this information and prove it up as we go.

And so thank you very much for participating in this. It takes a lot of courage. You have my admiration for doing it. I'm not sure -- I'm getting used to sitting on sort of this side of things, but as an ordinary citizen, I never participated in something like this. I would have been too nervous about it. And so you have my deep respect and appreciation for coming out tonight and talking the way that you have.

So thank you very much, and have a great weekend.
