

- Manage the nation's energy and strategic mineral resources on the OCS


Energy Policy Act of 2005



Gave the Secretary of the Interior the authority to regulate the production, transportation, and transmission of energy from sources other than oil and gas —

"Renewable Energy"

EPAct 2005 – Key Mandates



- Safety
- Environmental Protection
- Coordination with affected State, local and tribal governments and relevant Federal agencies
- Fair return
- Revenue sharing with States

The Regulatory Framework



- President Obama announced the publication of the final Renewable Energy Framework on Earth Day 2009
- 30 CFR Part 285 ("The Rule")

Coordination is Critical

■ 30 CFR 285.102 states that BOEMRE will provide for coordination and consultation with the *Governor of any State or the executive of any local government or Indian tribe that may be affected* by a lease, easement, or ROW



What is a BOEMRE Task Force?

A forum or a mechanism whereby:

- BOEMRE can share with interested and affected government entities information about its renewable energy program offshore a specific State and address potential renewable energy development opportunities on the OCS
- Elected officers of State, local and tribal governments and other Federal officials may provide meaningful and timely input in the implementation of the BOEMRE renewable energy program

What is a BOEMRE Task Force? Continued...

- The Task Force membership cannot alter the Regulatory Framework or established leasing processes, but can provide input on how the program is implemented
- BOEMRE will consider Task Force membership input in renewable energy program decisions

Opportunities for Input

- Task Force members will be able to provide input throughout the leasing process. Some examples are:
 - During the preparation of BOEMRE notices and announcements, for example: Request for Interest (RFI) and Call for Information (Call)
 - Identify potential conflict areas such as environmental, fishing, military, navigational, etc.

Why Establish a Task Force?

- Promotes efficient and effective communication
- A way to disseminate information in a timely and consistent manner
- Having all government parties at the same table facilitates information sharing as early as possible

Participation will give task force participants the opportunity to <u>actively</u> provide input into the leasing process rather than simply react to BOEMRE actions

Who is Part of the Task Force?



- Relevant Federal agencies with explicit or inherent governmental responsibility
- State government officials, designated by the Governor
- Local elected government officials
- Tribal elected government officials

How does the Task Force Operate?

- Established and coordinated by BOEMRE
- Richard Whitman, Oregon Natural Resources Advisor, leads State participation on behalf of the Governor
- Membership is dynamic
- Task Force is governed by an adopted Charter
